Hand, Hoof and Heart: New Volunteer Packet

Thank you for your interest in becoming a volunteer. Our volunteers are an extremely important part of our program and we wouldn't be able to offer our services without their help. Below you will find our volunteer guidelines and expectations. Your commitment is vital to the success of the program and we greatly appreciate each role our volunteers take on at the farm!

Volunteer Requirements

1. MUST BE AT LEAST 14 OR OLDER

 We will make exceptions for younger volunteers only if they are currently participating in our lesson program, have volunteered with our camps as a C.I.T. or pony staff, OR if they are involved in another lesson program in the area.

2. VOLUNTEER COMMITMENT OF ONCE PER WEEK

- We require our volunteers to commit to our program by coming out to assist at least once per week. There is no limit to how many times volunteers are allowed to assist each week.
- If you are unable to join us at the farm at any time, send us a quick email to let us know when to expect you back!

3. BE PUNCTUAL AND RESPONSIBLE * CONTACT US IF YOU ANTICIPATE LATENESS/ABSENCE*

 We appreciate your time and work while you are here; our lessons are dependent on YOU! Please be on time and ready to work. Make sure you have called or emailed us with as much notice as possible to let usknow you will be late or absent. Arriving between 5 and 10 minutes early is recommended.

4. BE UNDERSTANDING, PROFESSIONAL AND HELPFUL

You may encounter a variety of situations so please be understanding.
There may be other lesson students around while therapeutic lessons are
getting started, so volunteers are encouraged to promote all of oursafety
rules to anyone they see not following our safety protocols in or around
the barn. We all work together to keep each other safe and alert!

5. BE APPROPRIATE

- Please treat everybody with kindness and respect.
- Do not give out personal contact information or social media accounts to clients.
- Be aware of who is listening and watching. If you goof off, a clientmay think that is appropriate for them to do so, as well.

 Do not resort to physical contact with clients unless you have been directed to do so by the program director or your lesson instructor. Otherwise, please keep your hands to yourself NO MATTER WHAT.

6. ASK FOR HELP WHEN IN DOUBT - Don't be afraid to be heard

- There is NEVER an unimportant question when it comes to working with horses and our riders.
- Our lessons also serve as times for socialization with our riders.
 Volunteers are encouraged to converse, laugh and engage with everyone involved.
- We will never ask our volunteers to do something they are uncomfortable with or do not have experience with especially when it comes to handling of the horses.
 - Please do not attempt to retrieve a lesson horse if you have not been given prior permission from the instructor.
- This is not the right volunteer opportunity for you if you plan to stand on the sidelines and not interact.

7. RESPECT THE PRIVACY OF ALL CLIENTS

• Volunteers will only be allowed to take photos with permission from the program director, the rider and the rider's parents.

What to Bring and Wear

- Sturdy, comfortable CLOSED TOED shoes for safety and protection.
 - There are times where we will be working in puddles and mud.
- Any valuables need to be left in your car or at home, we are not responsible for lost or stolen items.
- Please wear clothes that are appropriate and you don't mind getting dirty. (i.e. jeans/long pants,tshirt/tank top, long shorts)

Volunteer Routine

- Arrive between 5 and 10 minutes early to lessons.
- Leave your phone in your car, purse, OR turn your phone on silent.
 Phones are not allowed to be out or used when working with our clients.
 Please note that ringing phones are a distraction and inappropriate during lessons.
- Check with your instructor for horse assignment.
- Greet your rider and get started!

Volunteer Duties

As a volunteer, you are a big part of the rider's journey towards independence. You will assist and support the rider as needed, as well as motivate your rider to work through tasks involving the horse. There are a few different roles that our volunteers play during our lessons, which we have described below.

- Volunteers will assist the rider during their entire time at the barn, which begins the moment the rider arrives to the farm. Greeting your rider is the first step!
- You will be responsible for helping the rider get themselves ready for their lesson. That includes helping to fit a helmet, assisting with changing intoriding boots, tying hair back, putting away personal belongings etc.
- The rider will need to be assisted while gathering equipment for their horses. Most of our equipment is labeled and we want to make sure we are always prompting our riders to help themselves, not just doing it for them.
- Set your rider up for success! If your rider stumbles upon something they don't
 quite understand, ask questions they know the answer to in order to boost their
 confidence.
 - Try to find connections between something they know really well or something that happens in their life regularly outside of the barn.
- Volunteers will help to keep the rider on task while grooming, tacking up, riding and un-tacking. Some riders may only need a verbal reminder, while others might need a physical prompt in order to focus on a task.
 - Example: Rider A needs to be a given a choice of two brushes in order to feel the difference between the soft brush and hard brush. Rider B receives a verbal prompt of "the opposite of hard is...".
- In the arena, volunteers will take on different roles. These roles include "leaders", "side-walkers" or "spotters".
 - Leader: responsible for walking the horse on a lead rope. The leader will be attached to the horse at all times unless told to un-attach by the instructor. If the leader is asked to do an "active hold" on the horse, that volunteer will be in charge of the direction, action (stop, walk, steering) and speed of the horse. During an active hold, the rider may be holding the reins, but may not be able to fully control the horse. A "passive lead" will have slack in the lead line. The rider will now be in charge of the direction of the horse, but the leader may need to provide extra support when needed.
 - o Side-walker: responsible for walking along side the rider and horse while

the rider is mounted. A side-walker is responsible for keeping the rider on task and making sure the rider is listening to direction of the instructor. A side-walker will actively participate during the arena activities and will offer physical support for unbalanced riders when directed by the instructor.

Spotter: responsible for providing an extra set of eyes on an independent rider, but not required to be right next to horse and rider. A spotter will provide assistance only when necessary which may only be verbal reminders to the rider during the lesson about body position or further explanation of an exercise.

****NOTICE: Wearing an ASTM/SEI approved hard hat (helmet) is required for all riders.

RULES, REGULATIONS AND POLICIES

These guidelines are to help maintain a safe and pleasant atmosphere for you and your horse, and are subject to being updated periodically:

- 1. Lesson fees are to be a paid the day off the lesson or in a package of 4 lessons. \$25.00 fee for returned checks.
- 2. Lessons must be cancelled at least 12 hours in advance.
- 3. ASTM/SEI Hard hats with a safety harness (chin strap), regardless of rider's age, must be worn at all times while mounted. NO EXCEPTIONS!!
- 4. No riding in flat, heel-less shoes. No riding without a bridle on the horse.
- 5. SMOKING IS PROHIBITED inside Proctor Creek Farm's buildings, offices and barns at all times.
- 6. NO DOGS on premises unless leashed, crated or otherwise confined.
- 7. Pick up wash rack / grooming area before you leave it (**DO NOT leave your mess until after you ride**). Muck buckets are provided for clean-up purposes. No halters to be left on the ground or hanging on crossties.
- 8. Children 12 years of age and under must be accompanied by a responsible adult supervisor (18 or over) at all times. The responsible adult does not include Proctor Creek Farm staff. This is for their safety as well as for others.
- 9. Minors (under the age of 18) must not be on Proctor Creek Farm property after dark without an adult.
- **10.** Anyone who is loud, disruptive or disorderly will be asked to leave the premises immediately.
- 11. NO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ON PREMISES AT ANY TIME
- 12. Do not ride in barns.
- 13. If someone is waiting to use the wash rack, please limit your time.
- 14. DO NOT borrow other people's equipment without specific permission from the owner.
- 15. All riders and guest must sign an Equine Activity Release and Hold Harmless Agreement



Release of Liability 2020

I am participating at my own risk. I have read this agreement and fully understand its content.
